SCHOOLS ADOPT TRAUMA RESPONSE SYSTEM TO SUPPORT STUDENT WELLNESS

Research shows that exposure to violence and trauma can negatively impact a child's ability to learn, form relationships and focus appropriately in the classroom. To support students in Placer County

who may have experienced trauma, a collaborative effort among local agencies led to the adoption and implementation of the Handle with Care program. CALY is proud to have been a part of early collaborations to bring this program to Placer County.

Handle with Care is a strategy to support children impacted by adverse and traumatic events. Handle with Care enhances communication and collaboration between first responders (law enforcement, fire

fighters, emergency medical responders, child welfare, etc.) and schools. An anonymous "Handle with Care Notification" alerts the child's school that they may have recently been exposed to a highly stressful or

traumatic incident (i.e. death in the family, fire, witness to a crime, loss of home due to a house fire, etc.) and to literally handle with care.

Placer County Office of Education (PCOE) recently introduced the Handle with Care system into our local schools to reduce the impact of trauma on our young people.

PCOE was honored with recognitions for innovation and leadership for developing and implementing Handle with Care.



RESILIENT PLACER: LOOKING UPSTREAM IN PLACER COUNTY

CALY has turned toward upstream thinking joining with the Resilient Placer Collaborative and partnering with organizations and community members to focus on addressing Social Determinants of Health and traumatic conditions that contribute to substance use. Similar to CALY's community-based coalition model, Resilient Placer draws from a range of sectors, including family services, education, health care, mental health, local government, justice and more. Some of the most important partnerships through this work are with agencies and partners such as Sierra Native Alliance, Latino Leadership Council,

Hip Hop Congress, the Black Student Union, and Granite Wellness Centers who support and represent people and communities that often experience health disparities around substance use and mental health.

Our partnership with Resilient Placer leverages the many strengths of our youth and our community. This upstream and trauma-informed approach to prevention addresses root causes and local conditions to prevent youth substance use and improve the well-being of youth, families and the most vulnerable members of our communities.

CADCA NATIONAL LEADERSHIP FORUM

CALY Coalition members including our youth sector leader and staff joined more than 3,000 prevention professionals from across the country for CADCA's National Leadership Forum. The Forum is an opportunity to learn the latest strategies to address youth substance use. National policy makers along with leading scientists and nationally known prevention experts have an opportunity to learn from each other and network. "Each year we return from the conference re-energized, more knowledgeable and inspired to implement new strategies to prevent youth substance use," said Shelley Rogers, Program Director.

BUILDING CAPACITY FOR PREVENTION

RAISING PLACER LEADERSHIP RETREAT

Themed, Connection, Culture & Creativity, the retreat brought Auburn and Lincoln youth and adult mentors and partners together for the first time since the pandemic. Responding to unprecedented times and needs for youth to be more connected, we created a hybrid model with a series of in-person and virtual activities. Kick Off Day at Auburn Regional Park began with Loren Nakai from Sierra Native Alliance storytelling and guiding us through native traditions and the symbolism of medicine bags and healing herbs for wellness. Local artist Stan Padilla shed light on how young artists can discover their voice through visual art and storytelling and how this process can teach us to better understand ourselves, our families, and our community. Serenity Madison, 2021 US Women's Disc Golf Champion, provided a mini training with youth on the basics of disc golf with a focus on fun physical activity to support mental health and wellness.



RESILIENT PLACER YOUTH FACILITATOR TRAINING & STAKEHOLDER BRUNCH

The Resilient Placer coalition project empowered young people as leaders, elevating their voice to advocate for positive changes. Youth were trained as facilitators through a series of workshops focused on social determinants of health (SDOH) and equitable approaches to prevention. We brought together diverse groups of youth from throughout Placer County along with adult mentors. We prioritized trust and relationship building which set the stage to learn and work together. We explored the presence of trauma within our communities and identified strengths and opportunities to build on and drive community centered healing. These efforts culminated in a Youth & Stakeholder convening in August 2022 where a panel of youth discussed SDOH and presented their ideas to address problems.

IF THEY CAN'T BUY IT, DON'T SUPPLY IT

CALY partnered with Lincoln Police Department, Placer County Probation Department and The Foundry Youth Center on a project that warns adults of the consequences of purchasing or providing alcohol and tobacco products for minors under the age of 21. CALY's Youth Sector Leader, Dylan Jolley, really showed his leadership skills by participating in this project and interviewing with local media to raise awareness. Dylan and his peers from Lincoln worked with the retailer and law enforcement to place warning stickers on alcohol and tobacco products at a 7 Eleven store in Lincoln. "I really feel like this sticker project will help remind teens and adults of the dangers of getting alcohol for kids," said Dylan Jolley.



TOWN HALL

CALY partnered with Granite Wellness Centers to host a Town Hall to raise awareness about fentanyl poisoning and what parents and youth need to know to stay safe. This session included Laura & Chris



Didier sharing their story of their son's passing due to fentanyl poisoning. Resources, including harm reduction and treatment resources, and information about the dangers of social media were shared. All Recov-

ery & Wellness sessions are recorded and made available on our websites, YouTube channels and shared far and wide on social media and via email listservs.

"1 PILL CAN KILL PLACER" FENTANYL AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

CALY, Granite Wellness Centers and partners from Placer County, the District Attorney's Office, and parents formed a committee to develop the 1 Pill Can Kill Placer fentanyl awareness campaign. The website, www.1pillcankillplacer.com, offers resources in English and Spanish to prevent fentanyl poisonings and save lives. The campaign elevates the message to teens, young adults and parents that prescription pills are not safe unless they are obtained directly from the doctor or pharmacy. This campaign continues to reach large numbers of the Placer County community through the website, parent presentations, student assemblies, news coverage from major news networks, billboard ads, social media, television ads, and podcasts.



CONVERSATIONS ABOUT CULTURE & HEALING

CALY and Granite Wellness Centers co-hosted the Recovery & Wellness series session titled, "Conversations about Culture & Healing: Bridging the Gap in Communication between Black African Americans and the Community." This session was facilitated by members of our community including youth, behavioral health providers and a community advocate. This was part of a series of cultural sharing sessions and included stories of lived experiences around racism, discrimination and stigma and included opportunities to improve communication and increase allyship.


Why 11th graders? By this time we see a trajectory related to substance use and coping skills for resiliency.

CURRENT SUBSTANCE USE








PRESCRIPTION DRUGS




Perceived Peer Disapproval


